

INSTRUCTIONS FOR AUTHORS

The manuscript Title : The title should accurately, clearly, and concisely reflect the emphasis and content of the paper. The title must be concise, informative, and grammatically correct.

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Abstract. These instructions give you guidelines for preparing papers for UMAB PoLSMER. Use this document as a template if you are using Microsoft Word. Otherwise, use this document as an instruction set. Paper titles should be written in uppercase and lowercase letters, not all uppercase. Avoid writing long formulas with subscripts in the title; short formulas that identify the elements are fine (e.g., “Nd–Fe–B”). The abstract describe briefly and clearly the purpose of the research, the principal results, and the major conclusions. In particular, the abstract must be self-contained, without, footnotes, or references. The abstract must be between **150–300 words**. Be sure that you adhere to these limits; otherwise, you will need to edit your abstract accordingly. The abstract must be written as one paragraph, and should not contain displayed mathematical equations or tabular material. The abstract should include three or five different keywords or phrases, as this will help readers to find it. Ensure that your abstract reads well and is grammatically correct.

Keyword : Immediately after the abstract, provide a maximum of 6 keywords (ones not in the title). Enter key words in alphabetical order, separated by commas.

Author names and affiliations. Where the family name may be ambiguous (e.g., a double name), please indicate this clearly.

Text formatting

- Manuscripts should be submitted in Word. The text should be in **single-column format**. Use a normal, plain font (e.g., **10-point Times Roman**) for text.
- Keep the layout of the text as simple as possible.
- Use italics for emphasis.
- Use the automatic page numbering function to number the pages.
- Use tab stops or other commands for indents, not the space bar.
- Use the table function, not spreadsheets, to make tables.
- Use the equation editor or MathType for equations. Please submit math equations as editable text and not as images

Introduction

The Introduction should state the purpose of the investigation and must include appropriate citations of relevant, precedent work but should not include an extensive review of marginally related literature. If the manuscript describes a new method, indicate why it is preferable to older methods. If the manuscript describes an improved analysis of a substance, the competing methods must be referenced and compared.

Material and Methods

Provide sufficient details to allow the work to be reproduced by an independent researcher. Methods that are already published should be summarized, and indicated by a reference. If quoting directly from a previously

published method, use quotation marks and also cite the source. Any modifications to existing methods should also be described.

Results and Discussion

Results and Discussion could either be combined or treated separately. The results should be concisely presented using tables and figures. The same data may not be used in both. However, many simple findings can be presented directly in the text with no need for tables or figures. The discussion should be concise and deal with the interpretation of the results. Appropriate statistical data should be given. Discussion must be developed logically in a proper sequence and should cover the implications and consequences not merely recapitulating the results.

Conclusions

The main conclusions of the study may be presented in a short Conclusions section, which may stand alone or form a subsection of a Discussion or Results and Discussion section.

Tables and figures

All tables are to be numbered using Arabic numerals. All numbered tables must be referred to in the text. The table should be few in number, carefully designed, uncrowded containing only essential data. For each table, please supply a table caption (title) explaining the components of the table. Keep column headings and descriptive matter brief and do not use vertical rules between columns. Keep tables to a reasonable size. Large tables should be divided into components. Footnotes to tables should be marked by lowercase letters (or asterisks for significance values and other statistical data) and included beneath the table body. Number figures consecutively with Arabic numerals e.g. Fig. 1. Tables and figures must be embedded within the text at appropriate places.

References (in the text)

Please ensure that every reference cited in the text is also present in the reference list (and vice versa). Unpublished results and personal communications are not recommended in the reference list, but may be mentioned in the text. If these references are included in the reference list they should follow the standard reference style of the journal and should include a substitution of the publication date with either 'Unpublished results' or 'Personal communication'. Citation of a reference as 'in press' implies that the item has been accepted for publication and a copy of the title page of the relevant article must be submitted.

Citations

Citations may be made directly (or parenthetically). Groups of references can be listed either first alphabetically, then chronologically, or vice versa.

Examples: «as demonstrated (Nacer, 2015a, 2015b; Tahar and Mahmoudi, 2017)..... » Or « ...as demonstrated (Jones, 1999; Allan, 2000)... Kramer et al. (2010) have recently shown ... ». This effect has been widely studied (Chikh 2001; Allou et al. 2005a, b; Selek and Jons 2009; Naseri et al. 2019).

Author contributions

Authors are encouraged to include a statement that specifies the contribution of every author to the research and preparation of the manuscript.

Example statement:

“All authors contributed to the study conception and design. Material preparation, data collection and analysis were performed by [full name], [full name] and [full name]. The first draft of the manuscript was written by [full name] and all authors commented on previous versions of the manuscript. All authors read and approved the final manuscript.”

Conflict of interest statement

- If the manuscript is accepted and no conflict of interest has been declared, the following statement will be published in the final article: “The authors declare no competing financial interest.”
- If some authors are members of the editorial board of the journal, a sentence should be included for the sake of transparency: “Some authors are members of the editorial board of journal X. The peer-review process was guided by an independent editor, and the authors have also no other competing interests to declare.”

Acknowledgments

Collate acknowledgements in a separate section at the end of the article before the references. List here acknowledgments of people, grants, funds, etc. The names of funding organizations should be written in full.

References

The list of references should only include works that are cited in the text and that have been published or accepted for publication. Personal communications and unpublished works should only be mentioned in the text. Reference list entries should be alphabetized by the last names of the first author of each work. Please alphabetize according to the following rules: 1) For one author, by name of author, then chronologically; 2) For two authors, by name of author, then name of coauthor, then chronologically; 3) For more than two authors, by name of first author, then chronologically. If available, please always include the full **DOI links** in your reference list.
