

Authors Instructions

Authors are invited to respect the instructions described below

1. Manuscript Page Limit

There is no limitation on the number of pages but conciseness of papers is greatly encouraged.

2. Title

The title should be brief and informative.

3. Author names and affiliations

Please clearly indicate the given name(s) and family name(s) of each author. Present the authors affiliation addresses (where the actual work was done) below the names. Indicate all affiliations with a lowercase superscript letter immediately after the author's name and in front of the appropriate address. Provide the full postal address of each affiliation, including the country name and, if available, the e-mail address of each author.

4. Corresponding author

Clearly indicate who will handle correspondence at all stages of refereeing and publication,

5. Subdivision - numbered sections

Split your article into clearly distinct and numbered sections. Subsections should be numbered

1.1 (Then 1.1.1, 1.1.2,), 1.2, etc. (the abstract is not included in section numbering).

Article structure

Abstract

The abstract should state briefly the purpose of the study, the principal results and major conclusions. Any references in the abstract should be written in full (names and year). List key words directly after the abstract, deliver a maximum of 6 keywords.

Introduction

State the aims of the work and provide an adequate background, avoiding a detailed literature review or a summary of the results.

Material and methods

Provide sufficient details to allow the work to be reproduced by an independent researcher. Methods that are already published should be summarized, and indicated by a reference. Any modifications to existing methods should also be described.

Theory/calculation

A Theory section should extend, not repeat, the background to the article already dealt with in the Introduction and lay the foundation for further work. In contrast, a Calculation section represents a practical development from a theoretical basis.

Results

Results should be clear and concise.

Discussion

This should explore the significance of the results of the work, not repeat them. A combined Results and Discussion section is often appropriate. Avoid extensive citations and discussion of published literature.

Conclusions

The main conclusions of the study may be presented in a short Conclusions section, which may stand alone or form a subsection of a Discussion or Results and Discussion section.

References

Please ensure that every reference cited in the text is also present in the reference list References are numbered and quoted (between square brackets [..]) in the text in order of appearance.

Recommendations

The entire document is contained in a space of 17 cm by 25.7 cm (2 cm recess on each side). The beginning of the article (title, authors, abstract) is contained in a 16 cm wide column. The rest of the text is displayed on two columns of 8.25 cm wide each, separated by 0.5 cm. With the exception of the title and the names and addresses of the authors which are centered, the whole text is justified. The paragraph titles are in bold, and the subparagraphs are in italics, Times New Roman 12, justified to the left. The lines of text within a paragraph are separated by single line spacing.

The tables must be inserted in the corresponding column, when they can be read, or in two columns if necessary. The numbering of a table must be in Arabic numerals and its legend in Times New Roman 10 (Table 1: Experimental values of viscosity at different temperatures).

Figures include graphics, drawings, maps and photographs, in black and white only. They must be inserted as images, with a resolution of 150 to 300 dpi, on one or two columns if necessary. The titles of the figures must be in Times New Roman 10 and numbered in Arabic numerals (Figure 1: Evolution of the viscosity as a function of temperature).

The equations are numbered and aligned to the left

NB: After acceptance of the article and its layout, a proofreading will be submitted to the authors. Authors receive free 03 copies of the Marefa Review issue. where appears their article and 05 pulled apart from their publication.
